


- Discuss which categories and indicators matched

Excitement does not = Engagement.

-What an engaged learner actually looks like & what we expect to see is sometimes different. -My expectations for engagement did not agree with the handout.

-Engaged students look different depending on the student and/or his ability level & motivation level.

-Student engagement need to be a priority.

- -It's okay not to see excited kids all the time.
- -"10 Standards" emphasizes independence.

-I always feel like I gain something new as far as what engagement looks like each time.

-You have to have a balance in your classroom!

- -Read a sticky note that said.....(Student Quote)
- "Group work allows me to learn from myself."

-Obedience does not = Engagement

-Try to engage EVERY STUDENT. Do not settle for compliant students.

-Teaching is a work in progress. :) I am a teacher - still a work in progress. :)

-Incorporate technology often -Small group/talking at table is most beneficial part of PD -I think I do a pretty good job of "knowing" my students, but I could do better. -Really enjoyed teacher commentary. I totally agreed with so many of their comments. :) -5 Myths about Engagement -"5 Myths..." Variable responses based on variety of student learning styles represented in classroom. -Keep 5 Myths of Engagement in mind. -Different b/n a kid that's engaged in their learning as opposed to one that is merely "compliant". -Myths about student engagement - An engaged kid is not an excited kid. -Student engagement comes in many forms. -5 Myths -Engaged students are in all shapes & sizes.
